Terry Vosbein – New Orleans LA

There is a long history of student jazz bands at the University. They went by a variety of names, and all were extracurricular. The **University Jazz Ensemble**, the current incarnation, was founded in 1996 by Terry Vosbein as an academic course within the Department of Music. Over the past twenty-five years the band has performed annual concerts on campus, showcasing the many talented students that have passed through its ranks. Additionally, they have performed in cities such as Boston, New York City, Philadelphia, New Orleans, and Atlanta, and have toured Russia, China, and Greece. Their most recent accomplishment was a highly acclaimed three-night run with the University's Repertory Dance Company, a first-time partnership between the two groups. Much of the music from that collaboration will be reprised on tonight's concert.

New Orleans born composer, **Terry Vosbein** has received numerous commissions to write works from such organizations as the Cleveland Orchestra and the Cleveland Museum of Art. He has arranged for such diverse groups as the Atlanta Pops Orchestra, the Virginia Choral Society, and the Glenn Miller Orchestra. He has composed works for orchestra, wind ensemble, various chamber ensembles, and choir. He has written works for jazz bands of all sizes. And his compositions have been performed all over the world.

"Stunning" is what jazz writer Will Friedwald called Fleet Street, Vosbein's second release with the Knoxville Jazz Orchestra. It is "full of surprises and is infused with a sense of humor that adds a special dimension that is too often missing in contemporary big band writing" (Joe Lang, Jersey Jazz). Of this setting of the music from Sweeney Todd, Jack Bowers (All That Jazz) said "the voice that emerges is unmistakably Vosbein's, placing a fresh and indelible big-band stamp on Sondheim's cogent narrative."

Vosbein is the founder and curator of the Stan Kenton Research Center, the only center dedicated solely to the music and career of the legendary big band icon and music educator. And he is the co-leader of the Vosbein Magee Big Band, an ensemble made up of the top musicians in the area, performing his compositions and arrangements.

When not spending his summers composing in exotic corners of the world, Vosbein is a professor of music in beautiful Lexington, Virginia. He received his Masters in Composition from James Madison University under the tutelage of John Hilliard, and his Doctorate in Composition from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he was a student of Donald Erb. He resides in Staunton, Virginia with his wife, Shannon, and their Alaskan husky, Luna.
