BIOGRAPHIES

Dr. Christopher Dobbins is the Director of Instrumental Activities at Washington and Lee University, where he conducts the University Wind Ensemble, University Orchestra, and teaches conducting and music education courses in the department. Prior to his appointment at W&L, Chris was Director of Bands & Brass Studies at Sul Ross State University and taught at Our Lady of the Lake University, Texas A&M International University, and Saint Mary's Hall College Preparatory School.

Chris holds the Doctor of Education in Music Education degree from the University of Georgia Hugh Hodgson School of Music. He also earned the Master of Music degree in Trombone Performance from the University of Utah where he studied with Larry Zalkind, Jim Nova, and Dr. Donn Schaefer. At Utah, he was a Graduate Teaching Assistant for the Utah Bands, where he worked with the Marching Utes, gymnastics band, and served as a guest conductor with the acclaimed University of Utah Wind Ensemble. Chris earned the Bachelor of Music degree in Trombone

Performance and the Bachelor of Music Education degree from Hastings College, where he was the institution's Theodore Presser Scholar in 2006. Chris is active as a conductor, clinician, and adjudicator. In addition to his academic conducting engagements, he is active as a guest conductor, conducting numerous performances of honor bands, music festivals, and academic and community ensembles in the US and abroad. He has been a guest clinician at a number of festivals throughout the country, and is often engaged as a guest clinician for high school instrumental ensembles and marching bands working towards contest. A strong advocate for new music, Chris has been part of more than sixty world premier performances since 2011.

As a trombonist, Chris has had the opportunity to perform in a wide range of styles. He has performed with the San Antonio Wind Symphony, the Heart of Texas Concert Band, the Orchestra of the Big Bend, the Utah Philharmonia, the Salt Lake Symphony Orchestra, the Stratford Street Big Band, and the Hastings Symphony Orchestra. From 2006-2016, Chris served as the Assistant Director of the International Trombone Festival, and has been involved with festivals from Salt Lake City, Utah to Aarhus, Denmark and many locations in between.

Chris maintains professional affiliations with the Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Virginia Music Educators Association, National Association for Music Education, the College Band Directors National Association, the College Orchestra Directors Association, the International Trombone Association, and Phi Mu Alpha

Sinfonia. He currently resides in beautiful Lexington, VA with his wife Heather, daughter Ginny, and a houseful of furry children. Chris is an Educational Clinician for Jupiter Band Instruments and performs exclusively on Jupiter XO Trombones and Hammond Design mouthpieces.

Shane Lynch, a noted conductor, composer, and music educator, assumed the position Director of Choral Activities at Washington and Lee University in the Fall of 2009. He conducts the University Singers and the Glee Club, and oversees W&L's innovative and unique conductor mentorship/teacher preparation program. Dr. Lynch is a sought-after clinician and guest conductor, having worked with groups throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia. Quite interested in musical scholarship, some of his recent research includes trends of Neo-Impressionism in modern American choral music and eurhythmic movements in the choral rehearsal and performance setting. He is also noted for conducting large-scale productions, including operas, oratorios, and festival concerts. Dr. Lynch has led choirs on several national and international tours, including featured performances in Scotland, South Korea, Italy, and Ireland.

Dr. Lynch has received numerous awards as an educator, including the Junior Faculty Member of the Year at Monmouth College and the Outstanding Faculty Service Award at the University of Wisconsin—Barron. An active composer interested in a wide variety of compositional styles and mediums, he has commissioned compositions ranging from octavos to choral/orchestral works. His piece *Joseph and Grace* premiered in Ireland for the 100th Anniversary of the Easter Rising and won the 2017 National Collegiate Choral Organization composition contest, and he recently served as Composer-in-Residence for the *Every Voice* Festival of the City of Derry International Choir Festival.

Prior to his appointment at Washington and Lee, Dr. Lynch served as Visiting Director of Choral Activities at Monmouth College (Illinois) and Director of Choral Activities at the University of Wisconsin—Barron as well as several past positions in church music and teaching high school science.

Shane Lynch graduated from Concordia College (Moorhead, Minnesota), with degrees in Music and Physics, received the Master of Music degree in Conducting from the University of Northern Colorado, and completed his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting at the University of Washington.

Lacey R. Lynch is an Instructor of Music at Washington and Lee University and conductor of Cantatrici. She holds a Masters of Music Education degree from James Madison University and Bachelor of Music degree from Concordia College, where she studied conducting with Dr. René Clausen. In addition to

her position at Washington and Lee, Professor Lynch has 19 years of choral, instrumental and general music teaching experience in both public and private schools, grades preschool to twelve, and is currently teaching at Natural Bridge Elementary School in Rockbridge County. Professor Lynch is also the artistic director of the Rockbridge Youth Chorale, a community youth choral program for children and youth preschool through twelfth grade.

Experienced in both Kodály and Orff-Schulwerk, Professor Lynch welcomes to her classroom and youth choirs numerous music education students from both Washington and Lee University and Southern Virginia University, serving as a mentor to future music educators and choral conductors. She is a member of the American Orff-Schulwerk Association (AOSA), American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), National Association for Music Education (NAfME), Virginia Highlands Orff-Schulwerk Association (VHAOSA), and the Virginia Music Educators Association (VMEA).

New Orleans born composer, **Terry Vosbein** has received numerous commissions to write new works from such organizations as the Cleveland Orchestra and the Cleveland Museum of Art. He has composed works for orchestra, wind ensemble, various chamber ensembles, and choir. He has written works for jazz bands of all sizes. And his compositions have been performed all over the world.

In addition to his activities as a composer, Vosbein was an active jazz bassist and arranger for over twenty-five years. He performed and arranged for a variety of ensembles, including the Glenn Miller Orchestra and the Atlanta Pops.

He resides in Staunton, Virginia with his wife, Shannon, and their Alaskan husky, Luna.

Anna Billias was trained as a concert pianist at the Prokofiev State Academy of Music in Donetsk, Ukraine (originally the Prokofiev Conservatory of Music) and graduated with advanced degrees in both performance and instruction for piano. During her school tenure, Dr. Billias performed with the school's symphony orchestra as a featured soloist and frequent accompanist throughout the Donetsk Oblast. Dr. Billias received her D.M.A. in piano performance from Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, VA. Dr. Billias is a Lecturer in Music and Collaborative Pianist at Washington and Lee University. She was formerly an assistant professor and the Director of Piano Studies and Collaborative Performance and an instructor of Russian language at Sweet Briar College. Since joining the faculty at Washington and Lee University, Dr. Billias has formed the duo "Anima e Grazia" with cellist Julia Goudimova. Recently Dr. Billias was

honored to join the Marlbrook Chamber Players, a well-regarded ensemble in the greater Rockbridge area, as a pianist. Dr. Billias has performed in numerous concerts at venues including Sweet Briar College; Hampden Sydney College; Lynchburg College; Liberty University; Randolph College; Eastern Mennonite University, Shenandoah Conservatory; James Madison University; in London, England; in Paris, France; in Derry, Ireland; in Crimea, Russia; and Donetsk, Ukraine. She has performed in Lynchburg for fundraising events for the Forte Chamber Music Festival, Opera on the James and for the Lynchburg Symphony Orchestra. She has been invited to judge CVMTA competitions, is a frequent jurist for musical events in Amherst, Lynchburg, and Charlottesville, and regularly volunteers her time performing at local retirement communities. Pre-COVID, Dr. Billias has performed at the Augusta Correctional Center as a public service project. Dr. Billias has recently had one of her collaborative pieces with Kevin and Bryan Matheson featured in a documentary about Scottish poet and lyricist Robert Burns. In her spare time, she is the music director at a local church in Lynchburg, VA, runs a growing private piano studio, and she is currently pursuing her black belt in karate. For many years, Dr. Billias has enjoyed serving as an accompanist for the Rockbridge Youth Chorale in Lexington, VA, and has recently been appointed the Director of the Children's Choir. She is the proud mother of three musically gifted children and a "Glam-ma" to her toddler granddaughter, and her husband, Christopher, is presiding District Judge in the Lexington, Rockbridge and Waynesboro courts.
